Incident Visa Case of Mrs. Pauline W. Oswald

Owen has cleared the attached letter to Mr. Carroll, Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, and his telegram to Moscow about the incident visa case of Mrs. Pauline W. Oswald. In considering this case I believe it would be helpful for you to have the following additional information. It refers to the general paragraph of visa memorandum relative to Mr. Oswald's statements that he intended to reveal information to Soviet authorities about his work as radio operator in the Marine Corps.

Oswald arrived at the Moscow Embassy on July 8 on his own initiative in connection with his desire to return to the United States with his wife, he was the second in length chronicle his activities and authorize the Soviet Union. There is quoted below the applicable paragraph from Embassy despatch No. 29 of July 11, 1951:

"Oswald stated that he had never been called upon to make any statements for radio or news or to interview anyone since his arrival in the Soviet Union and that he has made no statements of any kind of any radioable nature or order or written material to be made in the Soviet Union. He recalled that he had been interviewed briefly in his case at the Leningrad Hotel in Moscow on the third day after his arrival in the Soviet Union by a reporter from Radio Moscow. The reporter requested Oswald to provide some data from American sources on their operations in Moscow. Oswald stated that he made no more than a few routine comments of a walking tourist nature, the whole last of which was two or three minutes and of no political significance. When queried about a statement which he had made in the interview at Leningrad at the time of his first appearance at the Embassy on October 24, 1949, to the effect that he would willingly make available to the Soviet Union such information as he had acquired as a radio operator in the Marine Corps, Oswald stated that he was never in fact subjected to any questioning or pressure by the Soviet authorities concerning his life or experiences prior to entering the Soviet Union, and never provided such information to any Soviet agent. He stated that he doubted in fact that he would have given such information if requested despite his statements made at the Embassy."
