Dear Sire:

I am hereby requesting the Offices of the American Embassy and the Ambassador of the United States, Fr. Thropson, to act upon my care in regards to my application to the Soviet authorities for an out vica.

This application was made on July 20, 1961, and althrough three months have already elapted I have not received this vies. There was no difficulty with the application itself or with the supporting documents including my walld American passport Fo. 1733212, which was returned to my on July 8, 1961, at the American Embassy in Moscow, where it had been kept for safe-keeping.

I have made repeated inquiries to the proper offices in Minsk but I have, as yet, to receive a satisfactory assurer.

I believ there is justification for an official impury, directed to the department of "Internal Affaire, Prospect Stalin 15, Winsk," and the offices of the "address and passport office," Ulita Moskova, Colonel Petrakof director."

Also, I believ it is doubley important for an efficial inquiry, since there have been systematic and concerted attempts to intinidate my tife into withdrawing her application for on view. I have notified the libbary in regard to these incidents by the local authertities in regard-to my wife, these incidents had resulted in my wife being hospitalized for a five day
