

Storm of Political Controversy Swirls Around Kennedy on Visit

Love Field Braces for Thousands

Dallas police said Thursday night they anticipate that "thousands of newcomers" will jam Love Field to greet President Kennedy when his jet arrives here three Friday morning.

Police Capt. Chai King said officers anticipate parking lots at the airport will be filled long before the scheduled arrival of the President at 11:38 a.m.

Capt. King said police will divert additional cars into an auxiliary lot which commuters may reach by leaving right off Cedar Springs Road after passing the Republic Inn.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Weather Bureau forecast cloudy skies and occasional showers.

A memorandum will carry President Kennedy, Vice President Lyndon Johnson, Sen. Ralph Yarborough, Gov. John Connally and most Texas congressmen from the airport through highland-districted Dallas on the Trade Mart on Commerce Terrace.

Ed Reynolds, president of the Dallas Retail Merchants Association, urged secrecy and issuance of black fence holdings to By the U.S. Rep. He said the association also arranged for outdoor decorations.

Former Vice-President Richard Nixon, who ran against President Kennedy in 1960, placed police in strategic Dallas positions to give President and Mrs. Kennedy "a courteous reception."

Nixon, who was in Dallas for a meeting of anti-drug leaders, said demonstrators "burn their own candles and bring their opponents."

One anti-Kennedy faction scattered leaflets which condemned the President for his stand on integration. The leaflets also criticized U.S. foreign policy.

U.S. Atty. General Randolph said he was investigating to determine whether the leaflets violated federal laws. Police Chief Jesse Curry said officers feared scattering leaflets would face prosecution for violating "disturbance" ordinance.

Most downtown firms will give employees time off to see the memorabilia.

President Kennedy will ride in a blue convertible. If rain is falling, a pinkish bubble will give him shade.

The specially built car was flown here for use in the motorcade.

Police said the motorcade will move slowly so that crowds can "get a good view" of President Kennedy and his wife.

Democratic leaders said they were still hoping President Kennedy will make an impromptu speech when he enters the plaza at gate 17 on the east concourse of Love Field. This is the area where Mexican Airlines flights normally land and unload.

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
