ALFONSO MANCILLA GOMEZ advised that he is the caretaker at that museum, a position which he has occupied for the past twenty-five years. He related that few American tourists visit the museum and that he follows the practice of spending some time assisting and explaining the interesting exhibits of the institution to those tourists who do appear there. He stated that he believed he would remember most American visitors, and upon viewing a photograph of OSWALD, advised that he could not recall him as a visitor at the museum and did not believe he had ever seen him at the Museum of Natural History.

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## How You Can Help Greyhound Handle Your Baggage

We want you to have the best baggage service. Please read this panel and give consideration to:

### WHAT IS BAGGAGE?

Baggage is anything except hand-carried toilet articles and personal effects necessary for YOUR comfort or convenience during the journey. This definition includes such items carried for others other than yourself—or any items intended for sale.

Radio, firearms, money, negotiable papers, jewelry, perishables, liquids and household effects are NOT baggage. Loss or damage to such articles is the sole responsibility of the owner.

### MARK BAGGAGE CLEARLY

Mark each each piece of baggage with your name and home address, preferably an identification card placed inside each bag. Reference on outside tag will do. If you forget to do either, ask the ticket or baggage agent for an identification tag now.

### DECLARE BAGGAGE VALUE

On checked baggage you have insurance (on most states) for \$25.00 on each adult ticket—\$12.50 on each half-fare ticket. If further protection is needed, advise the baggage agent at the time baggage is checked. Protection can be increased to \$125.00 by paying 10 cents or to \$225.00 for just twenty cents.

### BAGGAGE WEIGHT ALLOWANCE

Up to 100 lbs. of baggage may be most states be checked on each adult ticket—75 lbs. on each half-fare ticket on an extra cost. Baggage weighing more than described above will be treated as a small additional charge depending on amount it weighs.

### SAVE STORAGE CHARGES

Check your baggage as soon as you arrive at your destination. Baggage left over 24 hours will be stored at 1¢ a day or \$1.00 for each month. Trunks and other large containers will be stored at 2¢ a day or \$2.00 for each month.

### CARE OF BELONGINGS

Chairs, wraps, strollers, beds, magazines, etc. cannot be checked and must be carried in the bus. Please be careful with your personal belongings or we cannot assume responsibility for loss, damage or theft inside the bus.

### REPORT LOST ARTICLES

If you forget articles when you get the bus, report them to the agent immediately. Also tell the agent if your checked baggage is missing upon arrival at your destination. He will make every effort to recover your missing items promptly.

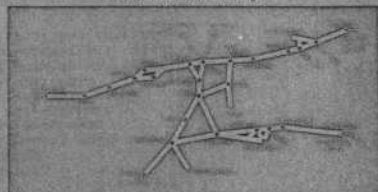

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**SHIPPING PROBLEM?**



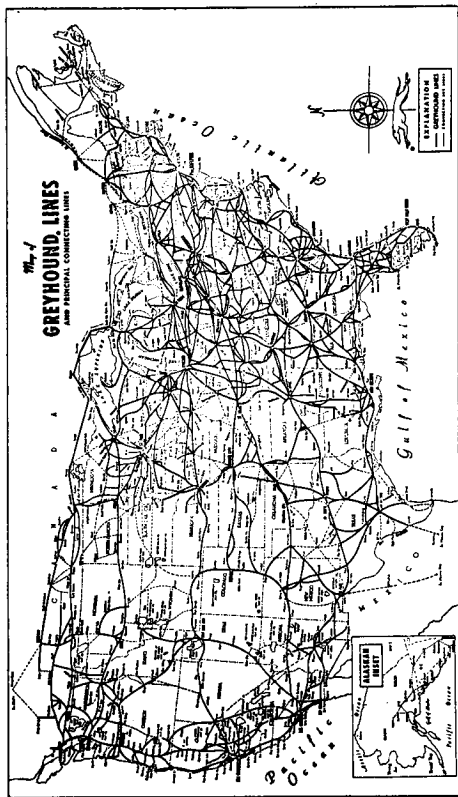

LEE HARVEY OSWALD

On May 27, 1964, Special Agent James H. (Mike) Howard, United States Secret Service, was interviewed in the presence of Inspector Thomas J. Kelley, Secret Service, by a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation with regard to an article which appeared in the May 9, 1964, issue of the "National Guardian", a weekly newspaper published in New York City. The article under discussion bore the caption, "Oswald Case: A New Angle", and information set out therein was attributed to Attorney Mark Lane.

Special Agent Howard explained that on Sunday morning, February 9, 1964, he, along with his brother, Pat G. Howard, Deputy Sheriff of the Tarrant County, Texas, Sheriff's Office, was assigned to transport Mrs. Marguerite Oswald from her residence at 2220 Thomas Place, Fort Worth, Texas, to Love Field, Dallas, Texas, where Mrs. Oswald was to take a plane to Washington, D. C., for purposes of her appearance before the President's Commission. Special Agent Howard further stated that at the insistence of Mrs. Oswald, he and his brother also were accompanied by Thayer Waldo, who, Mrs. Oswald explained, was making the trip with her from Fort Worth to Dallas at the suggestion of her attorney, Mark Lane. Howard related that after Mrs. Oswald was placed aboard the plane, he and his brother, along with Special Agent in Charge Forrest V. Sorrels of the Dallas office of Secret Service, went into the airport restaurant or coffee shop, also accompanied by Waldo. The news column in the "National Guardian" alleged certain conversation between Deputy Sheriff Pat Howard and Waldo and Special Agent Mike Howard stated he had no knowledge whatsoever of any such conversation between Waldo and Deputy Howard.
